1. Legal - Indecent images of children

BBC News reports that, according to NCA figures, more than 680 people have been arrested over the past nine months for downloading indecent images of children. 104 of these people were in "positions of trust", with 32 linked to education.

3. Police - Honour Based Violence (HBV)

Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary has published the report of their inspection into the police response to honour-based violence (HBV), forced marriage and female genital mutilation. In it they express concern that there is, as yet, no strong evidence base on what works in policing to prevent harm to and protect victims of HBV.

The Guardian reports that coercive or controlling domestic abuse (even if it stops short of physical violence) has become a crime punishable by up to five years in prison under section 76 of the Serious Crime Act 2015 which came into force on 29 December 2015.
